

Warrior Girl, by Carmen Tafolla


Celina is bilingual and celebrates both American and Mexican traditions. When a pandemic hits and her dad is deported, she must find joy through her heritage and finding her inner voice.


Spanish Is The Language of My Family, by Michael Genhart and illustrated by John Parra




***A Seed In The Sun*, by Aida Salazar**



Latiné-Focused Book Awards



Américas Book Award

Founded to encourage and commend authors, illustrators, and publishers who produce quality children's and young adult books that portray Latin America, the Caribbean, or Latinés in the United States, and to provide teachers with recommendations for classroom use.



Pura Belpré Award

Sponsored by the American Library Association, honoring Latiné writers and illustrators whose work best portrays, affirms, and celebrates the Latiné cultural experience in an outstanding work of literature for children and youth.



Tomas Rivera Children's Book Award

Honoring authors and illustrators who create children's literature depicting the Mexican American experience that is accurate and engaging, avoid stereotypes, and reflects rich characterization.

Fundacion Cuatrogatos



The Cuatrogatos Foundation is located in Miami, FL. This non-profit is dedicated to preserving Latiné cultural heritage in the United States, promoting the publishing of books in Spanish, and emphasizing the importance of reading and literature through education.

Every October, they hold “Fiesta de la lectura” (The Reading Festival) aimed at children, young adults, and teachers wanting to learn more about promoting reading in schools. It has a diverse program filled with everything from poetry recitals to literary workshops.
