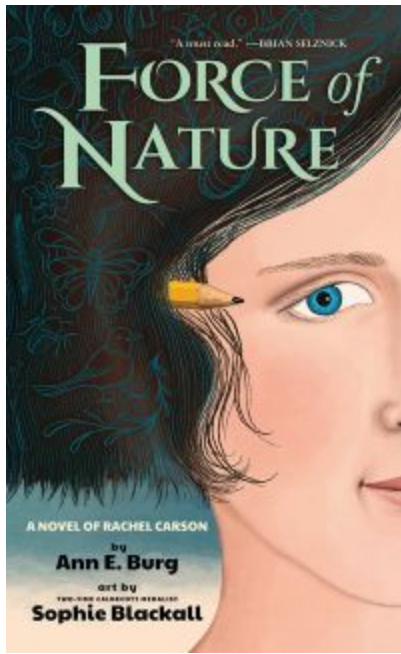
On November 14, 1960, first graders Leona Tate, Tessie Prevost, and Gail Etienne stepped into history by going to school. Escorted by U.S. Marshals and facing swarms of shouting protestors, they became the first children in New Orleans to integrate a previously all-white school. Like Ruby, the trio faced crowds of protestors fighting against public school desegregation efforts and relied on US Marshals to keep them safe. That day was just the beginning of their journey.

Black Pearl Books is a Black-woman-owned bookstore in Texas whose mission is to "promote diversity, inclusion, and representation through literature." During the 2023-2024 school year, Texas [pulled around 538 books](#) from the shelves. This bookstore's mission is to make sure that students and educators have access to all of the books that school districts have banned. They donate books to women's prisons, host author talks, and works with schools in Austin that want to start clubs centered around reading banned books.

Celebrating the Legacy of Jane Addams



As we celebrate Women's History Month, it is important to acknowledge the achievements and legacy of our namesake, Jane Addams. She was a feminist, a pacifist, and celebrated as the "mother of social work." Notably, she co-founded Chicago's Hull House with social reformer Ellen Starr which provided social services to poor families.

Jane Addams was also a pacifist and opposed war, speaking out against U.S. intervention in World War I. She believed that war caused social ills and resulted in the struggle of families across the world. More than just denouncing war, she believed in fundamental concepts such as freedom, kindness, and cooperation and used them as tools to change the world.

She was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1931 for her work; as she was involved in the women's suffrage movement, advocated for the rights of women and children, and was involved in the Woman's Peace Party among many other pursuits.



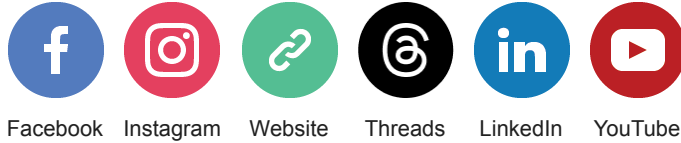
