***Fake Chinese Sounds*, by Jing**

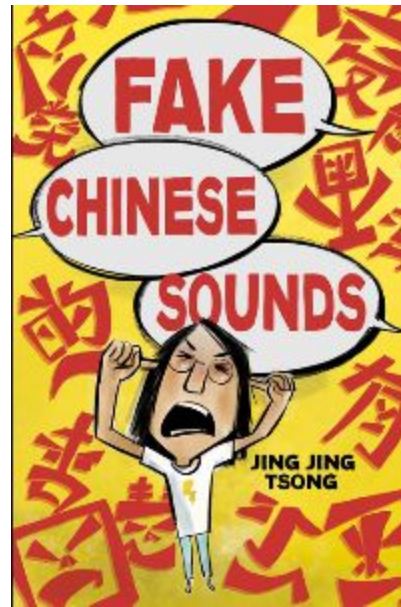
**Jing Tsong**

different story. Why did her family really leave Guatemala?

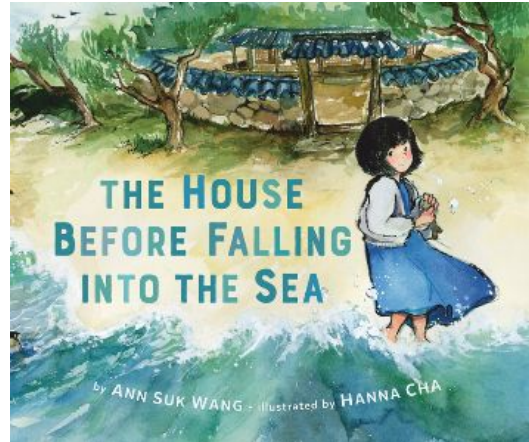
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***The House Before Falling Into The Sea*, by Ann Suk Wang, illustrated by Hanna Cha**  
(2025 Finalist)

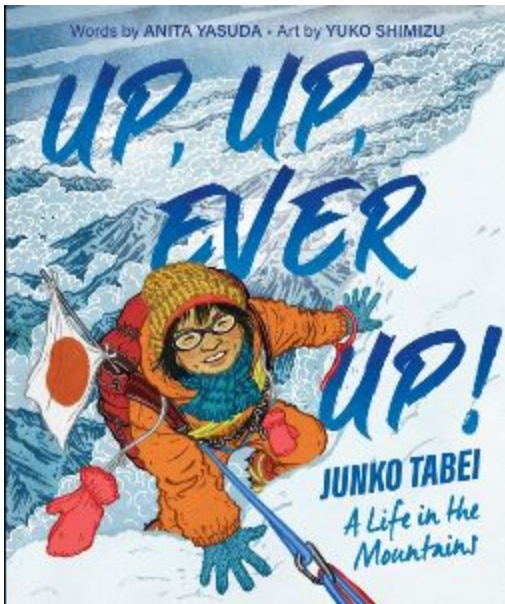
Every day, more and more people fleeing war in the north show up at Kyung Tak and her family's house on the southeastern shore of Korea.

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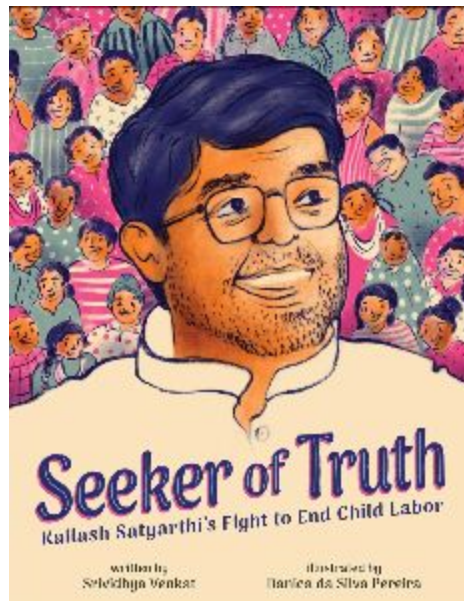
***Up, Up, Ever Up! Junko Tabei: A Life in the Mountains*, by Anita Yasuda, illustrated by Yuko Shimizu**

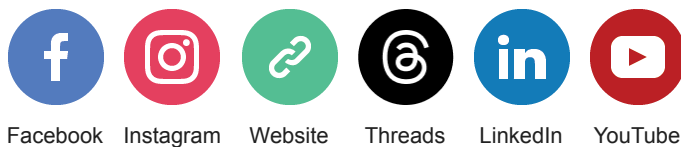
