
National Book Month




The Lost Year, by Katherine Marsh



Swim Team, by Johnnie Christmas


This graphic novel follows a middle schooler named Bree who reluctantly joins a highly competitive swim team at her school. Does Bree have what it takes to lead her school to victory?

This moving book depicts one of the worst instances of racial violence in U.S. history, when a white mob attacks a Black community in Tulsa's Greenwood district.




Rooted MKE BIPOC Children's Bookstore and Literacy Exploration
